On February 14, 1776, Thomas Paine's pamphlet, *Common Sense*, was published in Philadelphia. This important document explained the many reasons why Paine thought the American colonies should be independent from Great Britain. Many colonists who read his pamphlet came to agree with his ideas. For this reason, this document is seen as a very important piece of Patriot literature. (Over 500,000 copies of this 47 page pamphlet were sold in a matter of months in the colonies.)
